5.1 DRAFT ANNUAL PLAN 2023/2024 AND SPEED MANAGEMENT PLAN HEARINGS

PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to provide Council with the submissions on the Annual Plan 2023/24 and the Draft Speed Management Plan ahead of the hearings for those submitters who wished to present their submissions orally. The schedule and procedure for the hearing are also provided.

Hearings will take place on Wednesday 18 May (9am to 1:10pm) and Thursday 19 May 2023 (9am to 10:45am) at Waiata House.

RECOMMENDATIONS

That Council:

- 1. receives the full set of submissions on the Annual Plan 2023/24 (Attachment 1);
 - (a) **notes** that 203 submissions were received;
 - (b) **notes** of these submissions 25 are confirmed to be heard.
- 2. **receives** the full set of submissions on the Draft Speed Management Plan (Attachment 2);
 - (a) **notes** that 83 submissions were received;
 - (b) **notes** of these submissions 4 are confirmed to be heard.
- 3. **notes** that a Deliberations meeting for both the Annual Plan 2023/24 and the Draft Speed Management Plan is scheduled for 7 June 2023.

CONTEXT

Council adopted the Annual Plan 2023/24 Consultation Document and the Draft Speed Management Plan Statement of Proposal for consultation on 29 March 2023 [reports 7.1 and 7.2 2023 - refers].

Consultation on an Annual Plan is required to meet the principles of consultation as specified in Section 82 of the Local Government Act 2002 (LGA). The Special Consultative Procedure (SCP) as prescribed in Section 83 of the LGA was followed. The SCP complies with Section 82 requirements.

The Land Transport Rule: Setting of Speed Limits 2022 requires Council to use the LGA SCP for consultation on the Draft Speed Management Plan. Given that, consultation on the draft Speed Management Plan was run simultaneous to the Annual Plan consultation.

Both sections 82 and 83 of the LGA require Council to provide opportunities for people to present their views orally. A formal Hearing process is one way of enabling that.

CONSULTATION PROCESS

Consultation on both the Annual Plan 2023/24 and the Draft Speed Management Plan occurred between 31 March 2023 and 1 May 2023.

The Annual Plan 2023/24 Consultation Document, the Draft Speed Management Plan Statement of Proposal, and submission forms for both, were available on our website, from the Customer Services Centre (161 Queen Street) and the Library.

The opportunity to submit was widely advertised to our community via direct emails to key stakeholders and community groups, through social media (Facebook and Instagram), Antenno, GoogleAds, YouTube, Wairarapa Midweek and local radio.

Elected Members and Council staff hosted 10 'pop-up' sessions in town (Charlie's Lane next to Paper Plus), at Thursday Night Food Trucks (Town Square), and at the Car Boot Sale to raise awareness and for the community to ask questions about the consultation topics and how they could have their say.

The Mayor was also available to the community through drop-in sessions on Thursdays at the Customer Service Centre during the consultation period.

Consultation topics are included as Attachment 3.

SUBMISSIONS

Submissions for those who will be heard as part of this Hearing are included in this agenda. The schedule of submitters to be heard is included as Attachment 5 and their submissions are included as Attachment 6.

Full sets of all submissions received are available under separate cover and are also available on our website (see Attachment 1 (Volumes 1 and 2) for all the submissions received on the draft Annual Plan and see Attachment 2 for all the submissions received on the draft Speed Management Plan).

Annual Plan 2023/24: submissions

A total of 203 submissions were received on the Annual Plan 2023/24. 25 submitters are speaking to their submissions.

154 submissions were made online, using the online platform (SurveyMonkey). 32 completed their submission on the physical submission form. 17 provided their submission via email or letter.

Draft Speed Management Plan: submissions

A total of 83 submissions were received on the Draft Speed Management Plan. Four submitters are confirmed to speak to their submissions.

75 submissions were made online, using the online platform (SurveyMonkey). Five were completed on the physical submission form. Three provided their submission via email or letter.

HEARING PROCEDURE

The hearing procedure is attached for reference (Attachment 4). Submitters will be heard in person or via Zoom. Those speaking to their Draft Speed Management Plan submissions are scheduled first across the timeslots on each day, followed by Annual Plan submissions. Where a submitter has submitted on two items, they have been allotted 10 mins for each consultation topic, and their discussion should remain on the specified submission they are speaking to.

DELIBERATIONS

Analysis of the submissions and trends will be presented to Council as part of the Deliberations reports for the Draft Speed Management Plan and the Annual Plan 2023/24. These reports will include advice from staff regarding the submissions received.

Council will discuss the submissions received, submission analysis and proposed recommendations; consider the views of the community and advice from staff; and make decisions at the Deliberations meeting scheduled for Wednesday 7 June 2023.

NEXT STEPS

Following this Hearing, a Deliberations meeting will take place on 7 June 2023 where Council will decide what will be carried forward into the Annual Plan 2023/24 and the final Speed Management Plan.

The final Annual Plan 2023/24 and Speed Management Plan will be submitted to Council for adoption at the 28 June 2023 Council meeting.

SUPPORTING INFORMATION

Strategic, Policy and Legislative Implications

Section 82 of the Local Government Act 2002 (LGA) sets out principles of consultation which must be met when undertaking consultation.

The Land Transport Rule: Setting of Speed Limits 2022 requires Councils to use the Special Consultative Procedure as specified in Section 83 of the LGA for the consultation on a draft speed management Plan. The speed management plan supports the community outcome to provide a safe place in which to live work and play by assisting pedestrians, cyclists and motor vehicle users to safely move around the Masterton District.

Section 83 of the LGA specifies how consultation must be carried out for certain matters, and this applies for both the Annual Plan 2023/24 and Draft Speed Management Plan consultation processes. Requirements include preparing and adopting a consultation document (Annual Plan) or statement of proposal (Speed Management) and encouraging people to present their views.

Significance, Engagement and Consultation

Consultation using the Special Consultative Procedure was undertaken from 31 March 2023 to 1 May 2023 for both Annual Plan 2023/24 and the Draft Speed Management Plan.

The recommendation to receive and hear submissions on the Annual Plan 2023/24 and Draft Speed Management Plan does not trigger any additional criteria under the Significance and Engagement Policy.

Financial Considerations

There are no specific financial considerations associated with the receipt or hearing of submissions.

Treaty Considerations/Implications for Māori

21.3% of people in the Masterton District identify as Māori (Census 2018). There are no specific implications for Māori arising from the receipt or hearing of submissions. Analysis of submitter demographics will be included in the deliberations report.

Communications/Engagement Plan

The opportunity to be heard was included in the Annual Plan 2023/24 Consultation Document, the Statement of Proposal for the draft Speed Management Plan and the associated submission forms.

Environmental/Climate Change Impact and Considerations

There are no environmental/climate change impacts or considerations arising from the receipt of this report. The deliberations report will comment on any key themes related to Climate Change and the Environment that are noted in submissions.

Attachment 3: Consultation Content Summary: What we consulted on

Annual Plan 2023/24

The Annual Plan process provides an opportunity to review what was planned for the year in the relevant Long-Term Plan taking into consideration any new information and/or changing circumstances.

The 2023/24 financial year is Year 3 of the 2021-31 Long-Term Plan. Having considered work programmes and budgets for the year, Council agreed to consult on the following three topics for the Annual Plan 2023/24:

- 1. Council's proposed approach to reduce the rates impact in 2023/24 by \$185K. This was a multi-pronged approach including:
 - (a) Increasing user fees and charges to off-set rates generating an additional \$65K
 - (b) Introducing new e-waste fees generating an additional \$10K.
 - (c) Supporting our community to identify alternative funding opportunities and reducing the Council budget for community grant and community event funding reducing rates required by \$88K.
 - (d) Reducing Council's own events budget and seeking external funding to make up the difference reducing rates required by \$22K and seeking external funding for council projects, events and initiatives wherever possible.
- 2. Whether the Masterton District should join the Wairarapa Dark Sky Reserve, noting an estimated cost of \$20K and that some behaviour change would also be required to minimise light pollution in the district.
- 3. Whether Council should support the Five Towns Trail project in 2023/24 by contributing \$27,624, noting this contribution would enable the establishment of a Trust to implement the project and that further funding would be required that would be consulted on as part of the 2024-34 Long-Term Plan if our community supported Council contributing funding in the 2023/24 year.

Council also chose to use the Annual Plan consultation as an opportunity to seek feedback that will help shape the 2024-34 Long-Term Plan. The community were invited to provide initial feedback on the reduced scope of the Civic Facility, the Library and levels of service. Feedback received will be shared with Council once the analysis is complete. There will be further opportunities for the community to have their say on the 2024-34 Long-Term Plan next year.

Draft Speed Management Plan

Councils are required under the Land Transport Rule: Setting of Speed Limits 2022 to develop Speed Management Plans.

Recent changes to the Land Transport Rule: Setting of Speed Limits 2022, and direction from Waka Kotahi (New Zealand Transport Agency), mean Masterton District Council (MDC) must create a 10-year Speed Management Plan that sets out our approach for managing speed and safety within the Masterton District, including safety goals, speed limit changes for the roading network, and engineering improvements. It is required that the plans are developed in 2023 in time for the 2024-27 National Land Transport Programme. The plan will be reviewed on a three-yearly basis.

MDC has taken a staged approach to speed management. The principles of our plan focus on roads around schools, marae, and high-risk roads with a high crash rate. The proposed changes are both the lowering of speed limits in some places, as well as safety improvements particularly focused on improved signage.



Under the Land Transport Rule: Setting of Speed Limits 2022, changes around schools and marae must be made by 2027. We do not propose to make changes to high-risk roads before 2027, unless there are significant changes to the road conditions and assessed risk.

The Speed Management Plan that we have prepared aligns with the goals set out by Waka Kotahi, with the changes proposed in a way that will support compliance and community buyin to the changes.

I strongly feel the 60k speed limit on Te Ore Ore - Bideford Road should be extended from Castlepoint Road along to around past the blind bend in the road opposite Te Ore Ore Marae, which is currently 100k, as it poses many dangers to the residents trying to exit their driveways where vision is very limited around the bend so logging trucks cars motorbikes commonly travelling at considerable speed around the bend are forced to veer towards the centre of the road and even across the centre line at the sudden sight of vehicles about to merge onto the road in front of them as they come around the bend. - The Eastside Community Group would first like to acknowledge the Council for the work it has done to improve Eastside; the development of McJorrow Park; the enhancement of Kowhai Corner; instalment of traffic safety tables; tree planting on River Road.
- 2. The group is also appreciative of the annual grant given to enable community activities as well as the grant for the Eastside Festival.
- 3. The Masterton District Council will be aware that Eastside is recognised as being high on the national Deprivation Index. It is a low socio-economic area.
- 4. Indeed, a drive though "The Block" would confirm that it is not a well looked after area.
- 5. The Eastside Community Group, being a group of residents who work for the improvement of the area proposes that a few small immediate actions would enhance the area. These being:
 - a. Removal and replacement of the panel fencing at McJorrow Park
 - b. The care of grass berms.
 - c. Further beautification.
 - d. Continuation of annual funding.
- 6. Fencing at McJorrow Park:
 - a. The panel fences were erected in 2020. There was no consultation with the community about the fencing. The current panels create a barrier to the park, making it unwelcoming. The panelled fencing restricts the view of nearby residents and is certainly not a desired outlook. Indeed, it is a blot on the horizon and detracts from the park being a welcoming park. Accordingly, it is requested that the panels be removed and a more open fencing be erected similar to the earlier fencing.

- 7. Care of grass berms.
 - a. Requests have been made to Council to have the grass cut lower by contracted mowers, and to spray the grass berms to remove tap root plants. The requests have not been successful.
 - b. The current grass cutting height is at a level where property owners would normally consider that the grass needs cutting. Indeed, it seems that about 20% of the residents themselves now mow the berms to keep them tidy.
 - c. A response (November 22) from the Manager Community Facilities and activities stated that the height was to 'avoid hazards such as stones being accidentally picked up by the mower". The only visible and occasional hazards on the berms happen to be the occasional vehicle being parked on a berm (quite visible and easily avoidable). The grass being cut lower would not inhibit sustainable growth.
 - d. It is noted that there is weed spraying of the edges of the berms, but the Eastside Community Group has been advised that Council does 'not provide the level of service to spray a selective broadleaf chemical'.
 - e. If this practice were to continue, the berms will soon be patches of broadleaf not grass untidy and unsightly. Not a good look for Council property.

8. Further beautification

- a. More roadside tree planting would enhance the area. Not only would it make the area more attractive but would be a small effort in the reduction of greenhouse gases.
- b. Kowhai Corner could further be made more attractive with further planting.

9. Financial support

- a. Financial support given to the Eastside Community has allowed for the following activities
 - i. Support for families in need
 - ii. Activities for kaumatua
 - iii. Property beautification
- b. It is hope that this support will be continued for the next financial year.





Introduction

We appreciate the opportunity to provide feedback and advice to Masterton District Council referring to consultation and input into Masterton District Annual Plan 2023/2024. Councils play an important role in ensuring communities are fully inclusive of everyone allowing people with Impairments or disabilities to independently access and therefore move around with ease all areas of the community in which we Live, Work & Play A key part of this is ensuring that council services and infrastructure are accessible to all. Although this might seem obvious, smooth Foot Paths, roads, curbs and inclines can Improve Access and therefore Improve the wellbeing of not only those people living with an experience of Disability or Impairment but entire communities.

Improved access strengthens communities, by ensuring everyone can participate. Improved access also improves business and tourism opportunities.

How we live work and connect affects everyone's wellbeing but experiences we have vary for everyone. Stats NZ released data on disability that confirms almost one in four New Zealanders are disabled.

We encourage Council to consider the needs of all their citizens, rather than focus just on efficient or cost-effective infrastructure and services. A narrow focus on efficiency can result in Councils cutting corners with access. This can have significant effects on the wellbeing of disabled people.

Disabled New Zealanders do not get a fair go.

Too often disabled people do not get a fair go. They do not get the same opportunities as non-disabled people.

A lack of accessible infrastructure, including a lack of mobility car parks, plays a role in isolating people from their community and preventing them from accessing work, social, and educational opportunities.



CCS Disability Action Encourages Masterton District Council to exceed and increase the number of Mobility Parks available. Although we note a proposed reduced scope of both the upgrade of Queen Street Masterton and the proposed Civic Centre Facility it is extremely important to consider increasing Mobility Parks around any upgrades, particularly in areas with high traffic volumes or around venues where community events are held at present or into the future. Making this consideration now, helps ensure a greater level of opportunities for inclusion for Disabled People and their whanau.

We also note proposed costs increases of 'User Pays' services provided by Masterton District Council Services. Some people living with a Disability or Impairment will struggle meet these increases as often we are in the lowest income brackets of Society and do not get the same opportunities to earn meaningful incomes therefore I would encourage Masterton District Council to keep any increase in costs to an absolute minimum.

The Availability and affordability of Accessible housing options for Disabled people and their whanau is of major concern to CCS Disability Action and the people the organization supports, especially given the ever increasing cost of living crisis, so again any increase of Senior Housing Rent costs should be kept to an absolute minimal increase (if they require an increase at all. Any increase may result in Seniors with a disability or impairment living in poverty

Consideration of Access should be given across all Masterton District Council facilities and public events such as Halloween or other events held on the QU11 Park island. Alternative placement of events in other areas of the park should be considered so people with mobility aides who can not access events on the island are not excluded from attending. This should include consideration of the use of green and open spaces

Planning for access

It is important to consider access issues when planning how our communities and transport systems develop.

Accessibility is an on-going goal rather than a set of minimal standards to be complied with. There is always room for improvement, especially as new and innovative approaches are constantly being developed.

We note that throughout Masterton District Council's Annual Plan 2023/24, alternatives are presented to the proposed projects. Whatever decisions are made to proceed with these, we ask Masterton District Council to empower the Disability Sector and make this town the blueprint for accessible communities into the future.

Summary:

- We support the principals driving this Plan, being mindful of the past as we move into the future.
 - Funding for a new civic facility.At a reduced scope but with Access and inclusion being a high priority (CCSDA could provide advice and support regarding this)
 - Revamping Masterton CBD with greater provision for increased Mobility Parking. I have included an attachment of current number of Mobility Parking Permits throughout Wairarapa. Mobility Parking Permits last 5 years and demand for these will only increase along with the demand for Mobility Parking Spaces
 - Minimal if any increases in User Pays Services of MDC

- 4
- More Accessible Housing options be considered for people with Disabilities (Particularly Seniors)
- Work to continue on Foot Path and Roading making Masterton more accessible and imclusive for everyone
- Greater consideration be given by MDC when hosting public events to provide accessible and more inclusive environments for all
- We would like to see access as a high-level priority in the Annual Plan, 2023/24 especially in the main areas of focus.

Recommendations:

- Masterton District Council develop and expand on the goals of an engaged and empowered community. Masterton/Whakaoriori is a positive, strong, inclusive and self-determining community, with equitable opportunities for everyone leaving no one behind. For Masterton District Council to be a truly inclusive Council, we would recommend the adoption of an inclusion policy across all areas of council work.
- Masterton District Council works collaboratively with the disability sector to progressively identify access barriers in the community and remove them. That collaboration and co-design is a part of all projects to ensure that all new projects are fully accessible, meet Universal Design best practice and provide a fully accessible journey from home to destination.
- We recommend that Council continue to provide Mobility Parking Spaces, especially in the Town Center Revamp, and proposed Civic Centre that an increased number are provided to respond to the



demands of the aging population growth. Information on the location of Mobility car parks should be easily found on Councils website along with any restrictions and costs.

- 4. We recommend that Council collects regular accurate data on the ability of people with access needs to move around their community and access services (We can provide tools and advice to effectively do this).
- 5. We recommend that Council requires major new housing developments to have universal design features and promotes universal design in all new housing. (Our Lifemark brand can assist with advice on how to achieve this). Further information can be found at www.lifemark.co.nz
- 6. All housing developments aim for a minimum of 15% of stock being fully accessible.
- 7. That roading and pavements, become shared pathway conversations to meet the need of multimodal complete streets solutions. All users get benefit from the budgeted spend. Investment in maintenance of current pedestrian infrastructure should link to new projects to ensure full accessibility.

About us.

CCS Disability Action is a community organisation that has been advocating for disabled people to be included in the community since 1935. We provide direct support to approximately 5,000 children, young people and adults through our 18 branches, which operate from Northland to Invercargill. Our support focuses on breaking down barriers to participation. We receive a mixture of government and private funding.



CCS Disability Action has a national network of access coordinators, who work with local government and transport operators to create a more inclusive society. We also run New Zealand's nation-wide Mobility Parking Permit scheme. This scheme currently supports more than 150,000 people to more easily access their communities and facilities. This figure is only projected to increase into the future as the number of individuals affected by living with a Disability or impairment increases factoring in an ageing population

Our fully owned subsidiary, Lifetime Design Ltd, advocates for and provides universal design guidelines to improve the accessibility of New Zealand housing.

We have developed an accessibility app called Access Aware. We are a member of the Access Alliance, which is pushing for a new Access Law. We manage Lifemark, which certifies and promotes universal design standards for houses. We have developed ways to collect data on access, including the Measuring Accessible Journeys project and the Street Accessibility Audits

Conclusion.

Masterton District Council has a vital role in ensuring the growing number of people with access needs can participate, contribute, and be included in their communities. Unless council proactively ensures the accessibility of the community, we risk cutting more and more people off from their community and the services they require to live their daily lives. The impact of the aging population growth will bring an increase in the numbers of people with impairments and increase the need for Universal Design standards and the ability to make Accessible Journeys. Access and Inclusion are needed in the Plan.

Thanks for the opportunity to make a submission to the annual plan.

I only have two comments....

I am concerned that the e-waste fee won't encourage people to recycle their e-waste. It now costs to drive to the ewaste site, so that's a barrier to recycling. To also add a fee, creates another barrier. Its much cheaper to put it in the Wheelie bin, where most will then end up. The e-waste side should be funded by central government from a fee put on new electronic equipment. You need to lobby central government.

I have been in discussion with council for a number of years now regarding properties like mine that end up paying an excessive amount in rates, far exceeding what most people would consider reasonable. David Paris had done some work on this, under the instructions of Lyn. They looked at the proposal of making a maximum rating of something like 2 average rates. However, this seems to get continually kicked down the road, waiting for the next council review.

We are not against paying more than our share of rates, as this is how we support each other in the community. However, there does need to be some balance. The council is trying to introduce more user pays as this is considered fair. I pay over \$180 per week in total rates, which is very difficult to justify, hardly fair, and difficult to pay.

We came to Masterton from Wellington. We had an old (rotten) house in the city, which we sold for around the same price as our place in Masterton. While the house in Masterton is larger and more expensive than many here, we are hardly considered rich, do not have the cashflow and excessive money to burn. Masterton needs to encourage people to come here and purchase the big old properties and incentivise them to invest in them.

INTRODUCTION

My submission covers a number of topics, some with one line comments and some with lengthier material. The overriding intent behind my thoughts is to firstly restrict Council spending to what is necessary, secondly to ensure that every item of expenditure is justified in its entirety (zero budgeting), and thirdly to ensure that the rates that derive from the Annual Plan are affordable for the ratepayers and residents of the town.

"To ensure that every item of expenditure is justified in its entirety" and my reference to zero budgeting relates to quite a large number of entries in the document where comments such as 'to offset increased costs' are used without any explanation of what those costs are – or whether they actually exist, or might be anticipated. The use of "to better align with Council's funding policy' appears often – but with no explanation as to how the proposed increase actually 'aligns' with the policy.

An example – *LIM fees are to increase by 10% etc etc.....* (Page 10) – surely your computer software produces a LIM Report at the press of a key on the keyboard perhaps not, **BUT** exactly what costs have increased that suggest the charge for a LIM Report should increase by 10%; when the production of the Report is essentially a standard administrative process simply repeated whenever a Report is required.

User Pays Fees

I favour in principle the 'User Pays' concept where it is clearly identified that the service being supplied is specific to one individual or corporate body etc. I do not support Council making money, ie profit, from providing such services. Where you are proposing increases to User Pays Fees then I have to assume that you can justify the increases through real identifiable cost increases actually experienced, or genuinely and sustainably forecast.

Dog Registration

The one area where I believe Council should reconsider its approach (with the User Pays principle) is with the cost of Animal Services and the charging of dog registration fees. The actual cost of renewing the registration of a dog is minimal (as opposed to an animal being registered for the first



time). As with LIM Reports referred to in my Introduction dog renewal registration is simply the press of a key on the keyboard and whammo, out go the Notices by email (at no cost) and in flow the requisite payments so just some reconciliation work required by a clerk in the office.

Dogs do not need a registration tag – supposedly they are all chipped these days; surely that is your common ownership identification/registration. So, hardly a costly exercise.

So, why does the registration of a dog have to cost \$100.

It is the unregistered dogs in the town that cause issues, not those owned by folk who register their animals.

Using the User Pays approach it should be those who cause MDC to employ dog rangers to keep the streets clear of stray dogs, who should pay heavily (**User Pays!!**) when they claim their dogs. Every citizen in the town benefits from this service (ie keeping the streets clear of animals), not just the conscientious folk who pay their dog registration fees.

The Animal Shelter – aka The Dog Pound

One has to wonder what is to be provided for the dogs that will be housed <u>temporarily</u> in a new dog pound. Yes, Masterton needs one. But – at a cost of \$2.5M come on, you have to be joking? I live in a two bedroom house which my latest insurance renewal (April) tells me will cost \$430,000 to re-build. For \$2.5M I could build nearly six similar houses – all to the latest building code requiring double glazing, full insulation, carpeted etc etc!

Hello, what planet are we all living on?

A dog pound costing \$2,500,000... even the original budget of \$1M was over the top – what has occurred over the past twelve months to cause a **150% increase**. Frankly, this is unbelievable – I suspect that the original budget of \$1M would still build a very high spec dog pound that would be the envy of any homeowner.

Please be open and transparent – and tell the community exactly what it is that justifies \$2.5Million for a new dog pound.

If not then reduce the budget back to a realistic and affordable level.

The Civic Facility

What a misnomer this is

Masterton does not need a gold-plated fantasy project which you currently call a Civic Facility, that is to cost well in excess of \$70M. More importantly, the community of Masterton can not afford such excessive expenditure. Consign this proposal to the place it belongs – the waste basket. We have an I-site, we have a Library, we have a Municipal building with offices. There is no justification to build new facilities – **BUT** we do need a replacement Town Hall...

Town Hall - what the town needs is a replacement for the Town Hall, the existing one rightly consigned for demolition by a previous Council. Why has this not happened?

A replacement Town Hall could be developed on the existing site as has been shown by David Borman's presentation to the community (under the MAG banner) a year or two ago.

This plan includes Exhibition and display space and is adaptable for conference use at very little extra cost.

The existing site simply needs the condemned Hall demolished. Alternative sites will only add substantially to the costs.

Council needs to apply the KISS principle and use some common sense (KISS = Keep It Simple Stupid....)

Library – there is a general belief in the community that the Library needs more space, and perhaps a refurbishment and/or design upgrade of the existing facilities. I support this.

BUT only on its existing site.

Some years ago Council acquired the land next door (currently occupied with temporary Portacom buildings – unused at present?) and it also put aside a sum of \$5M+ to expand and upgrade the existing facility. This commitment has never been carried out.



Why not?

I say get on with the job and do it now. You have the land, you have the funds, you made the commitment – **why are we waiting!!**

Municipal building – the existing Municipal building can be brought up to the required earthquake standard at a reasonable cost, and yes, it does need some internal re-design and refurbishment. But this can be carried out also at a reasonable cost – which would return the building to its original purpose as offices for Council employees.

And in doing so the existing façade that most of the community want retained will continue to grace the Chapel Street frontage. Previous Council agreed that the façade should be retained – retain the building supporting it as well; common sense!

It is also located very closely to Waiata House which now appears to be the centre of the senior administration team. Having all Council staff on the one site must be a desired option. It is a no-brainer – again, David Borman has concept plans and costings that prove this approach a more than viable option.

Masterton has a **Town Square** – currently it is hardly ever utilised as a Town Square. It just sits empty. Redevelop the Town Hall/Municipal buildings site (as envisaged by the Horwath Consultants presentation some years back) as a genuine community friendly area, and people will start appreciating and using it. Oh, you might have to plant some trees in the Square to enhance its appeal.

Access to the Square could be enhanced with a pedestrian bridge over Chapel Street from the end of Bannister Street.

In fact, Bannister Street from Queen St to Chapel St should become a pedestrian precinct – perhaps something similar to eat Street in Rotorua. (Maybe this suggestion could be included in the CBD Revamp proposals – as referred to on P. 24 of the Document.)

As a Postscript – we have the design and building contractor capability in the Wairarapa – and specifically Masterton – to do all the above. MDC should look closely at utilising this existing resource rather than utilising the most expensive architects in the country.

Hood Aerodrome

This facility tends to be shrouded in mystery with decisions seemingly made behind closed doors. MDC should not be spending any more funds on Hood than have already been committed under existing contracts, i.e. no new work should be committed to.

The community should be consulted as a matter of priority as to what should be happening in reference to any future development.

The aerodrome should also be operating as a source of funds rather than a subsidised operation as it does at present.

Why is the "User Pays' principle not being applied with a greater emphasis on those benefiting from their use of the aerodrome paying the actual costs of providing the facility?

Roading

It is suggested that the \$500,000 Flood Damage fund that has been spent recently will be replaced in 2023/24 – why can this not be spread over two or three years; and perhaps lift it to \$1M which may be more realistic for future years.

Staffing Costs

It is proposed to lift average annual salaries from \$96,630 to \$103,211, up by 6.8%. Currently all staff at MDC benefit from four weeks annual leave (one week more than most employees receive in NZ) and full private medical insurance paid for, in addition to their salary and KiwiSaver contributions.



The average individual income in Masterton is less than \$60,000 (approx. \$57,000), with the statutory three weeks annual holiday, and no private medical insurance. It would seem to me that MDC staffing costs are well above the median for the town, well over \$40,000 per employee on average. Perhaps, given the current economic circumstances, consideration should be given to delaying a salary increase for a year, or applying a smaller increase of, say, 2.5%. Some may find this unpalatable – I would call it 'tough love'. I have seen arguments bandied around that to get staff MDC has to pay the same rate as, say, Auckland or Wellington. This is poppycock – in my experience, over many years of both employing staff, and being an employee myself in varied locations around NZ including Auckland and Tairua, there is no doubt that wage and salary rates are generally lower in rural/provincial centres such as Masterton than in the main centres of Auckland/Wellington, often by quite a large margin. I acknowledge the value of staff (and intend no disrespect to MDC's staff) and the need to remunerate appropriately – but the question does need to be asked, why is the MDC salary median 70% in excess of the average individual salary/wages median for Masterton?

I support Masterton in this project.

I support this project.

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Submission on the 23/24 Annual Plan

Re: Wastewater management

Thank you for receiving my submission.

I am a member of the Lansdowne Stream Chain group of residents, whose properties are affected by flooding in this area. We have significant concerns regarding wastewater management and a number of us have contacted the council in the past, to be advised that wastewater management would be consulted on in April 2023. I am taking this opportunity to again raise our concerns by way of feedback on the 23/24 Annual Plan.

I was somewhat dismayed to find there is little mention, let alone specific feedback requested, on wastewater management in the annual plan, just a paragraph at the top of page 20. If there is in fact a separate consultation process related to this, please advise me and pass this feedback on to the relevant group/officials.

Our group is keen to ensure our properties are protected from stormwater and sewerage contamination. We are keen to work with the Councils and any other relevant bodies to better understand and assist each other to exercise our respective rights and responsibilities.

I raise three key issues.

- 1. A coordinated approach: I assume, MDC, GWRC, Civil Defence, and CityCare all have roles to play in stormwater and sewerage control.
 - a. Are there any other key players in this?
 - b. What are the responsibilities of each agency?
 - c. Is there evidence of shared planning to minimise the impact on properties?
 - d. What impact will the 3 Waters changes have on this?

Wastewater management will require a coordinated approach with regular and consistent communication and planning both inter-agency, and especially with affected communities.

- 2. The 5th street dam: In February 2022 the 5th street dam was breached which was unprecedented, however, flooding of similar depth, with sewerage overflows, has occurred at least three times over the last 25 years at various points along the Lansdowne stream. While the February 2022 event was around 200mm of rainfall, the stream can overflow its banks at around 80mm of rainfall, so the dam is only part of a solution to flooding and stormwater overflow into the sewers.
 - a. What is the capacity of the dam and the probability of a further breach?
 - b. Given the weather pattern changes likely with global warming, is there potential to increase the capacity of the dam?



- c. What early warning systems could be put in place for residents along the stream chain in the event of near capacity or high stream flows, so they can take action to protect their properties, or take remedial action if affected by sewerage contamination?
- d. What assistance can the Council or other relevant agencies give property owners in the event of major flooding to minimise or mitigate damage to property? Eg: sandbags, rates rebates
- e. Has the stream been surveyed for bottlenecks and if so, have these been cleared?
- f. Is the capacity of the stream exponentially expanded over its length to accommodate high water flows?
- g. What are the plans for the Opaki water race, which also discharges into the 5th street dam?
- 3. Managing increased inflows: The Council has stated that new developments along the stream are required to be hydraulicly neutral.
 - a. When was this requirement introduced? How is this monitored?
 - b. Does this include the existing Lansdowne Retirement Village, development of the Totara Drive School site, Cashmere Oaks, and other individual infill housing that drain towards the stream?
 - c. Does the Council plan to introduce the requirement for all new builds to have rainwater storage tanks, and support existing builds to install them?

Depending on ground saturation, as little as 40mm of rain over several hours can cause significant surface flooding. We are seriously concerned at the increase in hard surface areas and the ability of existing infrastructure to manage increased flows.

Thankyou in advance for taking the time to consider these issues. I am happy to be a point of contact between the Council and the Lansdowne Stream Chain group. The Group is keen to work with the Council and relevant agencies, and keep affected residents informed.

I am enclosing a letter on aspects of the Annual Plan 2023 for the Masterton District on behalf of the Masterton District Youth council.

Dark Sky Reserve

We propose the annual plan includes introducing the Dark Sky Reserve to the District. Wairarapa Dark Sky Reserve is New Zealand's Second International Dark Sky reserve, but is yet to include Masterton. Opportunities like this are rare to see in Masterton, and it's a cool way to encourage more tourism in the area - attracting tourists to our town who can support the local economy and small businesses. Becoming a member of the Dark Sky Reserve would also be great for astronomers in the area, and also for schools and education facilities in the district as they can use this to their advantage in assessments etc. Becoming a member of the dark sky reserve would encourage more people to get outside and enjoy nature, spiritually and culturally connecting to their homeland. For example, becoming a member of the reserve would be great during Matariki - as it will bring more peoples attention to the event and teach people about Matariki and Maori culture. However, becoming a member of the dark sky reserve would require businesses to dim their lights, and the council to dim street lights at night time in order to not disturb the reserve (as it has requirements). This may be a struggle for local businesses, due to costs and efforts, but in conclusion we believe that this risk would be worth it.

Five Towns Trails

We also propose the annual plan to incorporate the *Five Town Trails*. The Five Town Trail is aimed to be a bike track from south to north Wairarapa and has been designed to showcase Wairarapa and its strengths, providing a good experience to visitors and tourists.

These features include:

- Clearly and strongly flowing rivers that rise from the Tararua Ranges and flow toward Wiararapa moana and later into the Cook Strait.
- Villages and Towns that provide a friendly and cosy atmosphere to locals and visitors.
- Māori heritage and English settlement stories
- World class wines of the region, in places like; Martinborough, Gladstone and Opaki.

The bike track has the potential to get young and old residents of the Wairarapa out and interacting with each other and nature. The track would increase tourism in the area and bring in more money to the local economy - it is estimated that the costs of the project will not take long to return back into the local economy. The bike track would be free,

which means it's an affordable form of physical fitness that everyone can get involved in. There is the possibility for new businesses, like food shops, to open around the track since it is likely that cyclists would invest in things from shops around the track. We suggest that safety lights would be added along the track, to ensure the track can be used safely at all times of the day.

Civic Facility

We believe that there is no need to spend so much money on a new piece of land, and that the facility could just be located in the area of the current town hall. This location would be more sufficient than other options, as it is right in the middle of town and would be easily accessible. We especially want the civic centre to be built with a green design, as sustainability is something that we need to ensure. We also suggest that a library is kept separate from the centre but is positioned fairly close together, it will be somewhere people can access study guides or assets, and historical information. We want the new Civic Centre to include;

- An Arts and Cultural space somewhere that schools and locals can use to express their culture and share it with the wider community.
- An information hub and customer service area A place that locals and visitors can use if they need help or have questions.
- A meeting room a place groups or individuals can hire out to use for meetings or discussions.
- An outdoor space Somewhere people using the facility can go outside to work and connect with nature.
- A play space Somewhere parents/adults can leave their children while they are busy in the centre, these places could include a playground, puzzle, or toys.
- Cafe Somewhere that people working or visiting the centre can buy food or drinks.
- An inclusion of Aratoi

We also have suggestions for the Library. We believe that with the increase in users of the library that it is sufficient for either an upgrade or rebuild. We want the new Library, or upgraded version to have;

- Computers and internet facilities, as well as access to a printer this can be used for fun or for study purposes.
- Chill out space Somewhere young and old people can hangout and chill while interacting with each other.
- Easily utilised searching systems for books.



- Study/Education Space A space where students from across the district can come to study, somewhere quiet and somewhere with desks.
- Māori and Pacific patterns incorporated in design eg; koru on the walls.

<u>Rates</u>

We also have ideas regarding the reduction of the rate's impact. Right now the increase in inflation and rates is having a huge impact on locals - physically, mentally, culturally and spiritually. In order to reduce this impact, we propose;

- A small but present reduction in user pay fees this could mean decreasing fees for some groups, and increasing for others.
- An introduction of e-waste disposal fees increasing the cost of e-waste usage, even though it won't be much, everything counts.
- Get rid of council jobs that aren't necessary For example, McJorrow park is mowed weekly. This cost could be saved and minimised to fortnightly or even monthly during summer, as it is reported that this park is not used until winter for sports and dog walkers take a concrete path.
- Collect e-waste and strip down for materials and sell profit.
- Less alcohol is sold, or the cost is increased possibly increasing tax on alcohol and decreasing it on necessities.
- Less unnecessary shops/places For example, there are many furniture stores in Masterton that are rarely used and unnecessary for a town of our size.
- An introduction of solar bins to reduce the amount of times bins need to be emptied.
- · Change street lights to solar power this would decrease its maintenance cost.

Thank you for considering our ideas. We are happy to discuss these further in person at the upcoming Hearing.
