

I am enclosing a letter on aspects of the Annual Plan 2023 for the Masterton District on behalf of the Masterton District Youth council.

Dark Sky Reserve

We propose the annual plan includes introducing the Dark Sky Reserve to the District. Wairarapa Dark Sky Reserve is New Zealand's Second International Dark Sky reserve, but is yet to include Masterton. Opportunities like this are rare to see in Masterton, and it's a cool way to encourage more tourism in the area - attracting tourists to our town who can support the local economy and small businesses. Becoming a member of the Dark Sky Reserve would also be great for astronomers in the area, and also for schools and education facilities in the district as they can use this to their advantage in assessments etc. Becoming a member of the dark sky reserve would encourage more people to get outside and enjoy nature, spiritually and culturally connecting to their homeland. For example, becoming a member of the reserve would be great during Matariki - as it will bring more peoples attention to the event and teach people about Matariki and Māori culture. However, becoming a member of the dark sky reserve would require businesses to dim their lights, and the council to dim street lights at night time in order to not disturb the reserve (as it has requirements). This may be a struggle for local businesses, due to costs and efforts, but in conclusion we believe that this risk would be worth it.

Five Towns Trails

We also propose the annual plan to incorporate the *Five Town Trails*. The Five Town Trail is aimed to be a bike track from south to north Wairarapa and has been designed to showcase Wairarapa and its strengths, providing a good experience to visitors and tourists.

These features include:

- Clearly and strongly flowing rivers that rise from the Tararua Ranges and flow toward Wiararapa moana and later into the Cook Strait.
- Villages and Towns that provide a friendly and cosy atmosphere to locals and visitors.
- Māori heritage and English settlement stories
- World class wines of the region, in places like; Martinborough, Gladstone and Opaki.

The bike track has the potential to get young and old residents of the Wairarapa out and interacting with each other and nature. The track would increase tourism in the area and bring in more money to the local economy - it is estimated that the costs of the project will not take long to return back into the local economy. The bike track would be free,

which means it's an affordable form of physical fitness that everyone can get involved in. There is the possibility for new businesses, like food shops, to open around the track since it is likely that cyclists would invest in things from shops around the track. We suggest that safety lights would be added along the track, to ensure the track can be used safely at all times of the day.

Civic Facility

We believe that there is no need to spend so much money on a new piece of land, and that the facility could just be located in the area of the current town hall. This location would be more sufficient than other options, as it is right in the middle of town and would be easily accessible. We especially want the civic centre to be built with a green design, as sustainability is something that we need to ensure. We also suggest that a library is kept separate from the centre but is positioned fairly close together, it will be somewhere people can access study guides or assets, and historical information. We want the new Civic Centre to include;

- An Arts and Cultural space somewhere that schools and locals can use to express their culture and share it with the wider community.
- An information hub and customer service area A place that locals and visitors can use if they need help or have questions.
- A meeting room a place groups or individuals can hire out to use for meetings or discussions.
- An outdoor space Somewhere people using the facility can go outside to work and connect with nature.
- A play space Somewhere parents/adults can leave their children while they are busy in the centre, these places could include a playground, puzzle, or toys.
- Cafe Somewhere that people working or visiting the centre can buy food or drinks.
- An inclusion of Aratoi

We also have suggestions for the Library. We believe that with the increase in users of the library that it is sufficient for either an upgrade or rebuild. We want the new Library, or upgraded version to have;

- Computers and internet facilities, as well as access to a printer this can be used for fun or for study purposes.
- Chill out space Somewhere young and old people can hangout and chill while interacting with each other.
- Easily utilised searching systems for books.

- Study/Education Space A space where students from across the district can come to study, somewhere quiet and somewhere with desks.
- Māori and Pacific patterns incorporated in design eg; koru on the walls.

<u>Rates</u>

We also have ideas regarding the reduction of the rate's impact. Right now the increase in inflation and rates is having a huge impact on locals - physically, mentally, culturally and spiritually. In order to reduce this impact, we propose;

- A small but present reduction in user pay fees this could mean decreasing fees for some groups, and increasing for others.
- An introduction of e-waste disposal fees increasing the cost of e-waste usage, even though it won't be much, everything counts.
- Get rid of council jobs that aren't necessary For example, McJorrow park is mowed weekly. This cost could be saved and minimised to fortnightly or even monthly during summer, as it is reported that this park is not used until winter for sports and dog walkers take a concrete path.
- Collect e-waste and strip down for materials and sell profit.
- Less alcohol is sold, or the cost is increased possibly increasing tax on alcohol and decreasing it on necessities.
- Less unnecessary shops/places For example, there are many furniture stores in Masterton that are rarely used and unnecessary for a town of our size.
- An introduction of solar bins to reduce the amount of times bins need to be emptied.
- Change street lights to solar power this would decrease its maintenance cost.

Thank you for considering our ideas. We are happy to discuss these further in person at the upcoming Hearing.

With the prevalence of ever increasing, in size and number, utes and SVUs on the roads and the way they are driven; along with the new roundabouts which I think will increase risk to cyclists lives, never has there been a better time for a safer network of roads connecting the towns for cyclists.

Ideally we need a cycle bridge over the Waingawa river so cyclists can safely get in and out of Masterton while avoiding the obvious dangers that exist now. For example at the end of South Road.

With climate change there needs to be provisions for cyclists to commute to work and between towns without being sandwiched by heavy vehicles and roadside barriers.

The Te Whiti Road **Construction** was made part of the NZ Cycle Trail but it was never widened; vehicles have though, so there is barely room for a cyclist and vehicle to pass. And when roads are widened such as heading north out of Masterton, it is often the shoulder that gets narrowed. Cyclists, trying to do the right thing for the environment and their health, are always the losers.

Please lets start taking into account, especially with the increase of ev bikes as a alternative mode of transport, people that choose to travel by more sustainable methods.

Please find below a submission regarding Archive and Library development for consideration in the Annual Plan process. We do not wish to appear at the hearings.

Upgrade of Library and Archive

We believe the idea of building a brand-new library and Archive in a new civic centre was both ill-conceived and far too expensive to seriously consider when the town has serious, immediate needs that have not been addressed.

We support the extension and upgrade of our library in its present position and the co-location of a new purposebuilt Wairarapa Archive on the site adjacent to the library. The land was set aside some years ago for such a development. This would provide a permanent home for both services in its present central location. Such an upgrade would save a considerable rent bill for the Archive which is presently housed in temporary rental accommodation.

We realise Council has gone to a lot of effort to house and equip the Archive's new premises with special digital and audio-visual facilities, climate-controlled record and storage rooms. However, though satisfactory for the present, this is not a permanent solution.

Meanwhile the library basement which provides a necessary storage facility for books and resources has a mould and water problem which should have been addressed years ago through a planned maintenance programme. Now it is a no-go area for staff for health and safety reasons. This problem has to be addressed and not just moved into a paragraph in the next annual plan.

While the Library and Archive have different functions they share much in common. Both provide a gateway to knowledge and information in an inclusive way and play an important role as a community hub.

In the 2015-25 Long Term Plan it was noted that the library was smaller than recommended for our population; our population is growing along with greater demand for computer access, e-issuing and internet use. Our current Archive is also dealing with an increasing number of requests for records and information and plays an important role in preserving our history. The two community facilities belong together and deserve a capital injection and upgrade to protect services for future generations.

As identified, we live in uncertain and challenging times where issues such as covid, and weather related events have had a massive impact on a reasonably small and somewhat increasingly transient community. The council has done well in identifying economic issues and has put forward some realistic options to keep rates increases as low as possible. Whilst some of the options may not 'make a lot of money' with limited funds, every bit counts. With this in mind public/private initiatives would be valuable in this space and should be encouraged. Things are changing across the world and whilst money 'makes the world go round' the human cost of increasingly difficult times should be equally considered. As such I would liked to have seem more mention of community resilience, to include health given the recent issues relating to cyclone Gabrielle and Covid etc as community resilience is key to ensuring we survive and keep each others best interests at heart and acknowledge each others rights. Even if we are rich and able to negotiate all the necessary projects if we are not connected to each other we have nothing. The AP might not be the best place to specify what this would look like as much of this involves non monetary options but considering initiatives such as increasing community food stands (excess produce), neighbourhood support/emergency resilience groups, options for groups to bring ideas relating to the environment. Each of these will encourage people to stay connected, seek help if needed and ultimately support MDC plans as we have a healthier more connected community. Currently we have people (whether by choice or not) with no housing, unable to register with a GP both of which impact our community. Local FB pages have folks reaching out for food and basic necessities of life on almost a daily basis; a big thumbs up at this point to those in our community organizing meals and resources. Whilst the council is not a social services provider it is in their best interests to work with community groups to help consider some of these issues; imagine if MDC could become the council that shows the rest of NZ what it looks like to work holistically across all paradigms. Every council staff member - from the CEO to the cleaner - should be regularly focusing as a part of their role on how they can increase the value that they provide to Ratepayers.

Just because something has always been done a particular way is no reason why it should continue to be done in that way if there is another way that achieves the same result more efficiently, or will reduces Rates, or provides greater value for the same money spent.

The council should start with a baseline of 0% rate increase year on year unless the council is presented with a properly prepared and presented business case that justifies the increased expenditure.

The business cases should quantify how any increased expenditure will result in increased efficiency (and thereby lower operating costs), increased value to ratepayers (greater bang for buck - more being achieved for the same number of staff/contractors/employees of contractors), or actual reductions in Rates and/or User Charges.

It is no longer acceptable for the council to think that the only way to square the budget is to demand increasing amounts of money year on year from Ratepayers.

If you don't receive funding for it, cut the service.

If the funding is inadequate, either increase efficiency or reduce the service.

If you have to choose between core council deliverables (water, parks and amenities, rubbish collection, etc) then prioritize the core deliverables over nice-to haves.

Hi guys.

As can be seen from my email address, I'm a building consultant and I charge at \$120/hour... probably a bit on the low side since inflation has been pretty bad lately.

Anyway, I make a profit by quoting jobs and working efficiently.

I see that you are putting the rate up for building consent officers (BCO) from \$210 to 230/hour.

When I was a BCO 20 years ago, we tried to be efficient, I'm sure your guys do too. We had to report monthly on our own productivity. At the time most of use guys returned about 70% productive time, that is time that could be charged to a project. Allowing for holidays & sick leave we would work about 1700 hrs a year so roughly 1200 was chargeable. If your guys are doing the same and charged at 230/hour that would equate to over 320k worth of income for the Council.

The question is; do you pay the BCO's this much? Half this much? If you do, I want my old job back! But probably you only pay them around a quarter of this. That means a 300% profit margin.

Is that ethical? How can you justify charging so much when the screws are about to be applied to everyone else in the industry, and then paying your team so little of it for the work they do? Why should building consent fees be used to subsidize other council activities and inefficiencies?





The Riversdale Beach Community Association (RBCA) work on behalf of the local residents and ratepayers of Riversdale Beach to ensure the wellbeing and resilience of the community and to liaise with Council on various projects. Riversdale Beach is a growing community with over 160 permanent residents and around 500 holiday homes with more under construction at present. Over the summer and long weekends, the number of people at Riversdale Beach swells to several thousand. We also now have a NZ Motor Caravan Association self-contained camping facility which is well used throughout the year. We believe the number of people travelling out to Riversdale Beach and spending time here will continue to grow over coming years.

Riversdale Beach is a great asset to the Wairarapa district and a very popular destination for all generations for both day trips and overnight stays.

The very active local community put in considerable volunteer hours to maintain the walking tracks at the southern end of the beach, hold working bees, market days and events for the community over the summer months. Whilst the community is relatively self-sufficient we are aware of a number of issues regarding council maintenance and development we would like to bring to Council's attention.

Recent extreme weather events have caused considerable damage to the road to Riversdale Beach and to the surrounding farming community. There was also considerable damage to the access way from the Riversdale Beach Surf Lifesaving Club (SLS) to the beach and lagoon area.

Storms continue to erode the dunes on the beach front, particularly at the northern end of the beach near the SLS club. In addition the pedestrian bridge that accesses the Southern reserve had considerable damage and is still awaiting permanent repair. Local residents put in a temporary fix so that walkers could still use the reserve and access the public toilets.

There was also considerable flooding to a number of houses during the cyclone Hale event and considerable flooding of the golf course.

We note that these types of events are likely to be more frequent and consideration needs to be given to ensure there is sufficient infrastructure to protect properties especially in the parts of the village where there is currently no curb and channel to direct the water away from houses. More regular maintenance of waterways around the village to remove logs would also prevent future flooding events.

Consideration needs to be given to a coastal protection plan to mitigate the impacts of climate change on our coastal communities.

We have seen considerable repair work on the road to the beach and gather Council has accessed emergency funding to complete this which we are grateful for.

We are liaising with Council officers regarding the damage to the access for the SLS as the life saving club is an essential volunteer service over the summer months and needs to be able to access the beach promptly. We gather MDC officers are working with GWRC regarding a resource consent to repair the erosion at this site.

We also understand the repair to the southern bridge will occur very soon.

We are working with Council officers on the Riversdale Beach Community Plan with considerable input from the community. A number of submissions called for more walking tracks, in particular bush walks with cover on hot days. We are aware there has been funding allocated to replant native trees at the Southern reserve over the next three years> We ask that Council incorporate shaded walking tracks amongst the native trees for use over the hot summer months as all current walking tracks are in the open. We also ask that funding be allocated for a "face lift" for the parking area at the southern end of the beach as this is looking rather tired.

RBCA will continue to work with Council officers to identify maintenance issues and follow up to ensure this work is done as promptly as possible.





The Library

The library no longer meets the community's needs. In the 2018-28 LTP we set aside \$5.3 million for a library upgrade, with any extra funding needed to come from external funders. The decision was later made to include the Library in the Civic Facility.

Submission on the 23/24 Annual Plan

Presented by Jill Stringer,

Re: Wastewater management

Thank you for receiving my submission.

I am a member of the Lansdowne Stream Chain group of residents, whose properties are affected by flooding in this area. We have significant concerns regarding wastewater management and a number of us have contacted the council in the past, to be advised that wastewater management would be consulted on in April 2023. I am taking this opportunity to again raise our concerns by way of feedback on the 23/24 Annual Plan.

I was somewhat dismayed to find there is little mention, let alone specific feedback requested, on wastewater management in the annual plan, just a paragraph at the top of page 20. If there is in fact a separate consultation process related to this, please advise me and pass this feedback on to the relevant group/officials.

Our group is keen to ensure our properties are protected from stormwater and sewerage contamination. We are keen to work with the Councils and any other relevant bodies to better understand and assist each other to exercise our respective rights and responsibilities.

I raise three key issues.

- 1. A coordinated approach: I assume, MDC, GWRC, Civil Defence, and CityCare all have roles to play in stormwater and sewerage control.
 - a. Are there any other key players in this?
 - b. What are the responsibilities of each agency?
 - c. Is there evidence of shared planning to minimise the impact on properties?
 - d. What impact will the 3 Waters changes have on this?

Wastewater management will require a coordinated approach with regular and consistent communication and planning both inter-agency, and especially with affected communities.

- 2. The 5th street dam: In February 2022 the 5th street dam was breached which was unprecedented, however, flooding of similar depth, with sewerage overflows, has occurred at least three times over the last 25 years at various points along the Lansdowne stream. While the February 2022 event was around 200mm of rainfall, the stream can overflow its banks at around 80mm of rainfall, so the dam is only part of a solution to flooding and stormwater overflow into the sewers.
 - a. What is the capacity of the dam and the probability of a further breach?
 - b. Given the weather pattern changes likely with global warming, is there potential to increase the capacity of the dam?

- c. What early warning systems could be put in place for residents along the stream chain in the event of near capacity or high stream flows, so they can take action to protect their properties, or take remedial action if affected by sewerage contamination?
- d. What assistance can the Council or other relevant agencies give property owners in the event of major flooding to minimise or mitigate damage to property? Eg: sandbags, rates rebates
- e. Has the stream been surveyed for bottlenecks and if so, have these been cleared?
- f. Is the capacity of the stream exponentially expanded over its length to accommodate high water flows?
- g. What are the plans for the Opaki water race, which also discharges into the 5th street dam?
- 3. Managing increased inflows: The Council has stated that new developments along the stream are required to be hydraulicly neutral.
 - a. When was this requirement introduced? How is this monitored?
 - b. Does this include the existing Lansdowne Retirement Village, development of the Totara Drive School site, Cashmere Oaks, and other individual infill housing that drain towards the stream?
 - c. Does the Council plan to introduce the requirement for all new builds to have rainwater storage tanks, and support existing builds to install them?

Depending on ground saturation, as little as 40mm of rain over several hours can cause significant surface flooding. We are seriously concerned at the increase in hard surface areas and the ability of existing infrastructure to manage increased flows.

Thankyou in advance for taking the time to consider these issues. I am happy to be a point of contact between the Council and the Lansdowne Stream Chain group. The Group is keen to work with the Council and relevant agencies, and keep affected residents informed.

1. I'm in favour of a civic facility, but I fear that because Masterton has been without a concert venue suitable for classical concerts for so long, there would be a huge struggle getting artists and groups to perform in Masterton.

Carterton and the South Wairarapa are very handy to Wellingtonians who are now heavily bolstering concert attendance. If I were organising a classical concert in my field now I would hold it in Martinborough or Featherston because the likely audience is so much better.

2. The present district library site - and the section where the Portacoms are currently - is sufficient room to expand the library upwards to house both that, sufficient stacks and secure storage for archival material. The library collection has become very fiction-focused in recent years, particularly as linear shelf space is at a premium in the present building. The library team has done a great job in managing to provide services that a modern library requires in a building designed for a library 40 years ago.

The Tinui district is being particularly poorly served in respect of the Tinui Memorial Hall, which celebrates its 70th anniversary in 2024.

- MDC

for the hall are difficult and uncooperative. This problem has been going on for several years.

- The building is being left to run down. It looks scruffy and dated. There are no heat pumps or other heating available. It is absolutely freezing in winter.

- We are interested and willing to do the building up (mainly painting and curtains) but the lack of cooperation from the MDC means the plans are languishing.

- The Tinui Memorial Hall complex is a very good 'budget' conference venue for 100-150 people. There are plenty of breakout rooms, excellent catering available locally, together with high-speed wireless broadband (WizWireless), for livestreaming, etc.

- We have sufficient beds (including Castlepoint Holiday Park and B&Bs) to accommodate conference visitors and it would bring money and people into the Tinui community.

- The entry on the MDC website - which calls it 'Tinui Hall', rather than the 'Tinui Memorial Hall' is unacceptable. It is inaccurate and very sparse.

- The MDC has gone to extraordinary lengths to keep people out of the hall by providing only one key

. This causes all sorts of problems when we're organising events like Anzac Day. On top of that, every internal room in the hall is locked. The hall custodian risked her life during the Cyclone Gabrielle flood by crossing the flood plain to open the hall for use as an emergency hub.

The emergency kit has suddenly appeared two months after the cyclone. We desperately needed the VHS radio in it when we were cut off for two days, but it was locked in a room by the MDC.

- The hall is currently unsuitable as an emergency hub. It has no generator (when Tinui Village floods, as it has done numerous times in its history, the substation also floods and there is no power for some days). There is no gas facility for making a warm drink or heating water if it needs to be boiled. We were fortunate that the recent cyclone happened in February but it would be a serious situation if the flood happened at night in winter - no lighting (apart from emergency) or any way of warming up people who had come through flood waters.

- The Tinui community needs to take over bookings for the hall complex. We know what it's capable of and how to market it. Currently all potential bookings have to go through disinterested staff at the MDC.

- In 2016 MDC gave permission to the Tinui Anzac Trust to put plywood over the rimu shelving in the library and install halogen spots so it could be used as an Anzac Memorial Room on one day a year. The community was NOT consulted about this. We have lost a very good and warm small meeting room. After the Cyclone Gabrielle flood we needed private space for MSD and IRD to meet with residents. The staff from these organisations had to work in the main hall, where everyone could hear very private conversations. The Anzac Day stuff in this room needs to be packed away and the room unlocked so it can be used for smaller meetings.

- The hall complex was paid for by Tinui residents to provide the office and civic facilities for the Castlepoint County Council. While the asset was transferred to the MDC in 1989 when the county councils ceased, the complex remains morally the property of the Tinui community.

- If I recall correctly the consultation document for last year's LTP round included a recommendation that handing of rural halls to their respective communities be investigated. The time is right for the MDC and a steering committee here to investigate transferring ownership of the Tinui Memorial Hall to a local hall trust.







I am submitting as chair of the Wairarapa Archival Society.

In 1989 the National Library trialled a Wairarapa-wide "Lost Records Search" in the period leading up to New Zealand's Sesqui Centennial. The number of records that were brought in from families and organisations was amazing and the need to store these records became an immediate imperative.

The Wairarapa Archival Society was formed as a result of a meeting called by the local branch of the New Zealand Historic Places Trust, with representatives from all over Wairarapa. It began collecting records regionally and premises were provided by the Masterton Trust Lands Trust while the Masterton District Council made expertise available through the Library budget. Over the intervening years the Society has assisted with volunteers and garnered funds for computers, shelving, cameras and other necessary items.

Since those early years the Wairarapa Archive has grown to be recognised as the pre-eminent provincial archive in Australasia with 25,000 of the 2 ½ million photographs of Wairarapa people and places available online along with access to almost every newspaper published in the region.

Based largely on these records some 33 books on Wairarapa history have been published by the Society – an accomplishment not equalled by major institutions much less provincial ones.

In recent years the need for new accommodation for the Archive has become apparent. The old WBS site was rapidly coming to the end of its useful life, and it was severely constrained as to extra shelving space.

The Wairarapa Archival Society has been pleased that the Masterton District Council has found space for the Archive in their new premises in Albert Steet. However, that site is also constrained as far as space goes, and in the medium term a new facility must be built.

The Long Term Plan has acknowledged the need to update the Masterton District Library and Archive, with funding set aside for this. We would wish to remind Council that in 1990 the Masterton Trust Lands Trust gifted the piece of land to the north-west of the library site, specifically earmarked for a future Archive site. Since then, Council has acquired adjacent land.

The Wairarapa Archival Society believes the value of having the Library and Archive co-located and sited in Queen Street cannot be overstated and commends to Council that this course of action should be followed.

The Wairarapa Archive Society remains committed to ensuring that the written record of Wairarapa's history should be retained in Wairarapa – we have recently given financial aid to the conservation of records damaged at Tinui by Cyclone Gabrielle – and thank Masterton District Council for their ongoing support.

Our Community Our Impact

Wairarapa Cricket has a Vision to promote quality experiences, engendering a lifelong love of sport and physical activity within the Wairarapa region. The combination of this Vision, a secure strategic direction and comprehensive action plans have contributed to a number of consecutive years of over 1,000 players registering and playing in Wairarapa Cricket competitions. When combined with physical activity programmes provided to well over 1,500 junior participants, the Wairarapa cricket community continues to grow and impact positively on a significant portion of the Districts wider population.

Wairarapa Cricket continues to be a national leader with regards to female cricket with both Central Districts Cricket and New Zealand Cricket viewing Wairarapa driven programmes as templates for female strategies. Many of these initiatives are now actively shared with other Cricket Districts to help increase capability and impact across a range of settings. The 2022/23 season has seen close to 350 registered female players partake in local competitions. These numbers make Wairarapa the largest female participation province in Central Districts despite having the lowest population base of all 8 districts.

Ever increasing numbers have allowed player pathways to become even more sustainable, and close alignment with all Major Association or National competitions have provided more opportunities than ever for Wairarapa based players, with selections at First Class, Age Group International, Age Group Major Association and New Zealand Maori (Secondary School and Senior).

Wairarapa are the project lead for Kia Hakinakinaa regionwide partnership based approach to enhancing play and physical activity opportunities for the wider community, with a particular emphasis on teacher support in the primary school setting.

Through this shared regional approach, the Kia Hakinakina project correlates significantly with Sport NZs purpose of inspiring play, and vision of Every Body Active, and is designed to create the building blocks to move into increased sport and recreation participation, whilst attaining the physical activity outcome of connected communities.

Our Proposal

The Park Tennis Club land is developed into a cricket training and physical activity facility for wide community use. **Our Vision**

- A futures-thinking facility developed to provide all year around cricket training & play opportunities to anyone in the community.
- Encompass the potential needs of projects, other sports and physical activity users as a visible base for community connections, events, programmes and open play support
- A sustainable, environment focused concept.







Whilst this proposal is the first step in detailed planning, the vision is for facility development that has the purpose of providing all year round cricket training, including evening use, whilst having the cross-purpose of other community utilisation where appropriate. Part of the vision includes the Kia Hakinakina project having a centralised, visible base to connect with the community, as a hub for events, holiday programmes and off-site school-based activities.

With its proximity to both the playing home of Wairarapa Cricket, the QE II Oval, and the Park Sports Ground, the land is in prime position to be utilised both pre and on match-days where appropriate, and ties in with the recreational hub development of the Park. This geographical position also extends the potential of Masterton and the Wairarapa being able to host First Class Female fixtures over future years.

From an initial meeting with Council Facilities staff, and a view of the area in discussion, it is the understanding of Wairarapa Cricket that the following land and area could be used for development. The courts themselves are approximately 38 metres long x 30 metres wide with an area of "wasteland" creating an L-Shape at the north-eastern corner which is to be cleared of self-seeding trees. This has the potential of adding a further 15 metres in length to half the width of the courts. This full area has the potential for significant options of use, with curtain siding allowing conversion to a full area for other activity.


Sustainability

Water Retention

One of a number of shared community climate concerns is water retention. The proposed development presents an opportunity to incorporate future risk mitigation thinking. Slimline water tanks could be utilised (even as surrounding fencing) capturing roof run-off.

Solar Power

Incorporating use of solar panels, including associated battery storage would cover all energy consumption by the facility with significant potential to extend this to power other electricity needs with the wider park.











Within both the Wairarapa Cricket Strategic Plan and our associated Risk Register we highlight environmental sustainability as a major drive moving forwards. 2023 additions to the land-use proposal as it stands could significantly align to this drive, as well as wider council and community thinking.

Water Retention

One of a number of shared community climate concerns is water retention. This applies across the region at many levels, and has particular bearing on the continued use of sports grounds during low rainfall periods.

There is an opportunity to incorporate future risk thinking into this development. Over the years there have been a number of discussions around the placing of water tanks to potentially alleviate some of the risk posed by ongoing drought.

There is potential that this is incorporated into the development of this facility, namely through slimline water tanks being utilised (even as surrounding fencing). Run-off from a cloud roof could be utilised all year around to fill the same.

With tanks such as the 5000L offered via various companies there is potential for 3 x 30 metres in length of tanks to surround the facility, offering potential of 150,000 litres of water storage. If done correctly with appropriate planting, it would also balance any potential "eye pollution" that may occur, and would certainly soften any noise from the use of the training area.

Energy Efficient

Additionally, incorporating use of solar panels, including battery storage of energy should mean zero requirement of the ongoing energy charges for the facility. Any internal heating, cooling, lighting requirements would not rely on the grid, and there is significant potential extension of supplying this power to other electricity needs within the wider park (if storage and capacity allowed).

Our Funding Model

Wairarapa Cricket are proposing this project with the understanding that a wide approach to funding needs to be applied. This will incorporate (but not be limited to):

- WCA / MDC joint approaches to Grant Funding
- Fundraising
- Central Districts Cricket Charitable Trust
- Sponsorship
- Community Donations

Ongoing Costs - Wairarapa Cricket will apply a needs-based approach to facility use – user pays charges alongside open use under agreements.

Wairarapa Cricket will strive to significantly self-fund this development through a process of applicable Trust applications (including but not limited to, Lotteries Funding, Trust House Eastern and Central Community Trust and the Central Districts Cricket Charitable Trust). In addition the expectation is that there will be a significant amount of community support (as we as an Association are consistently queried about the development of a facility of this nature) around fundraising and similar initiatives.

As a "training facility", to help support ongoing costs any user would have a user pays charge.

Wairarapa Cricket, even before development begins, would be looking at initial community contributions to the development of the facility. These contributions would be in lieu of guaranteed future use, which could provide (in an estimate) \$100,000 to \$200,000 of seed funding, outside of these other areas.



Potential Outcomes

- Third party investment into a currently disused portion of QE II Park.
- Centralised, independent, all year around availability of a cricket training facility (alleviating other significant private facility holder charges).
- A wet weather alternative for play and activity.
- Future thinking design aligned to different ways to participate and play
- Cross-purpose venue for other sports, activities or projects.
- Environmentally sustainable.
- Facility development allowing for potential hosting of higher honours "fixtures" at QEII Oval.
- Potential of "destination" cricket training and playing tourism from outside of the district.

I am currently serving my second term on Te Rua Wānanga the New Zealand Archives Council. As part of our briefings, we have been receiving regular updates on the progress of the Government's Ta Ara Tahi programme.

As I am sure you will have worked out, the literal meaning of this phrase is "The One Pathway", and it refers to the ongoing programme to better align the work of Archives New Zealand, the National Library (including Alexander Turnbull Library) and Ngā Taonga, Sound and Vision.

This is partly spurred on by the construction of Tāhuhu, the new Archives New Zealand building on Aitken Street. This is to have an airbridge link to the National Library building, and once the project is complete, Archives and the Library will share a common reading room.

The new Archives New Zealand building has been built with full design involvement of Taranaki Whanui, rather than the previously traditional process of including mana whenua near the end of the project, where they are asked to contribute some superficial design elements. This springs from the Te Ara Tahi determination to better include Mātaurangi Māori into the way the three institutions operate.

I have no strong feelings about the construction of a future Civic Centre, and whether the Library and Archive need to be part of that. However, I am certain that any future building for the Wairarapa Archive must take into account the need for the Library and the Archive to be co-located and to have a shared workspace, and a combined research area. It should also incorporate a space for the local genealogical group, as there is a strong alignment of interests. I think it best serves the community if the Library and archive are in Queen Street.

The new facility must also be much better digitally connected than the current Archive site, which has poor internet connection. This is because it has become clear that the future use of Archives, both nationally and locally, is going to be much more digitally aligned. Archives NZ has reduced the opening hours at both its Wellington reading room and at the various regional offices, as it has found it has more digital visitors than real, meaning more staff time needs to be allocated to digitisation projects. Similarly, in-person visitor numbers have fallen at the Wairarapa Archive, but electronic requests for material are increasing rapidly.

As the Masterton District Council continues its move into an electronic records system, it is imperative that the connection between its own corporate records, and those stored within the community whare taonga that is the Wairarapa Archive, should be better aligned, and made easier for the public to access. Similarly, the storage within the Wairarapa Archive, and access to the digital content needs to be made easier.

One area that is lacking at the Wairarapa Archive is an ongoing oral history programme. The commissioning of specifically focussed oral histories is an important way to democratise the recording of history, of enabling voices outside the mainstream to be heard. Previous oral history programmes have proven very valuable. In the 1990s, Bernard Manaena was commissioned to record several kuia and kaumatua, resulting in nine very valuable recordings of tipuna who have all passed. Other projects have looked at the 1950s migrants to Wairarapa (Ten Pound Poms), at descendants of early pākehā settlers as part of the 2004 sesquicentennial, and at those involved in the social movements of the 1980s – women's rights, Springbok tour, and the Vietnam War, for example.



The consumers price index increased 6.7 percent in the 12 months to March 2023, according to figures released by Stats NZ today.

The 6.7 percent increase follows a 7.2 percent increase in the 12 months to December 2022.

"Inflation is still at levels not seen since the 1990s," consumer prices senior manager Nicola Growden said.



Food was the largest contributor to the March 2023 annual inflation rate. This was due to rising prices for vegetables, ready-to-eat food, and milk, cheese, and eggs.

Vegetable prices increased 22 percent in the 12 months to March 2023, while ready-to-eat food and milk, cheese and eggs increased 9.7 percent and 15 percent, respectively.






