PURPOSE

This report provides the Awards and Grants Committee with the applications that have been received, seeking funding from the Community Wellbeing Grant and Community Events Fund. This is to allow for decisions to be made on the allocation of funding from the 2024/25 budgets.

These applications are summarised in Attachments 1 and 2 to this Report.

Also provided is the list of presenters who chose to speak to their application, either in person or via Microsoft Teams (refer Schedule 1).

CONTEXT

Community Wellbeing Grant

The Community Wellbeing Grant opened on 1 July and closed 29 July 2024 with four weeks available for applicants to apply. A total of 29 applications were received, two less applications than last year.

Part of Masterton District Council’s purpose under the Local Government Act 2002 is to promote the social, economic, environmental and cultural wellbeing of our communities in the present and for the future. To support this, the Community Wellbeing Grant is available to organisations and community groups that contribute to these wellbeings.

Our wellbeing outcomes are:

- *An engaged and empowered community*
- *Pride in our identity and heritage*
- *A sustainable and healthy environment*
- *A thriving and resilient economy*
- *Efficient and effective infrastructure*

Community Events Fund

The Community Events Fund opened on 1 July and closed 29 July 2024 with four weeks available to applicants to apply. A total of 22 applications were received, seven more applications than last year.

This funding is available to support diverse and exciting events, festivals and exhibitions that appeal to residents, contribute to the priorities identified in our Wellbeing Strategy and celebrate our culturally rich, diverse district and region.

The fund goals are:

- *to optimise the economic contribution of events to Masterton.*
- *to support events to be of a high quality.*
- *to support events to grow and appeal to a wider audience.*
- *to promote Masterton as an event visitor destination.*
- *to create a positive image of Masterton to residents and visitors.*

There are two key outcomes that link to our strategy:

- *A Thriving and Resilient Economy;* local events can attract visitors to Masterton that in turn provide economic benefits to the community.
- *An Engaged and Empowered Community;* events provide opportunities for our community to connect and engage with each other.

The Awards and Grants Committee allocated all funding to 13 events. Two events were unsuccessful for funding.

This year, \$184,982 is requested for funding 22 events, with 14 of these for the same events held in the last two years. There are eight new applicants applying to for events funding.

- **Schedule 1** - timetable for the 15 applications being presented at this meeting.

Seven applications are not being presented.

SUMMARY OF CONSIDERATIONS

Strategic, Policy and Legislative Implications

The continued funding provision supports Council's commitment to the Wellbeing's of the Local Government Act 2002 and aspects of both funds also align with Council's Arts, Culture and Heritage Strategy.

Significance, Engagement and Consultation

The Community Wellbeing Grant and Community Events Fund are not significant under the Significance and Engagement Policy because the decisions:

- do not relate to a strategic asset,
- do not involve a change in the level of service provided by council,
- do not impact on debt, rates, or the financial figures in the 2023 Annual Plan,
- do not involve council exiting an existing activity or adding a new activity.

Financial Considerations

There are no significant considerations as this funding is budgeted for in Year 1 of the 2024-34 Long-Term Plan, as follows:

- **Community Wellbeing Grant** **\$100,582**
- **Community Events Fund** **\$65,000**

Implications for Māori

The Community Wellbeing Grant and Community Events Fund are available to provide support for projects or events that contribute to the wellbeing's in the Local Government Act 2002 and Māori groups or individuals can apply for funding in the same way as any other organisation or community group.

A variety of social media channels were used to promote the Community Wellbeing Grant and the Community Events Fund. Application forms and information sheets were available on the website and at the Queen Street Customer Services Centre. Recent recipients were also contacted directly by the Grant Administrator and provided with the application form, information sheet and opening and closing dates.

Environmental/Climate Change Impact and Considerations

The Community Wellbeing Grant and Community Events Fund are available to provide support for projects or events that contribute to the vision and priorities in Council's *He Hiringa Tangata, He Hiringa Whenua* Wellbeing Strategy.

The vision and priorities that relate to the environmental strand of the strategy include the vision that Masterton/Whakaoriori has rivers we can swim in and drink from; clean air to breathe, green and blue spaces that we can enjoy and share with future generations; and the following Priorities: clean air and water; protecting our natural heritage and biodiversity; climate change action; creating a culture of environmental sustainability; and, working together as kaitiaki.

NEXT STEPS

The Awards and Grants Committee will consider the 29 Community Wellbeing Grant and 22 Community Events Fund applications, listed in Attachments 1 and 2, and decide on any funding from the respective budgets available.

Applicants will be advised on the outcome of their application by the Grant Administrator within two weeks after this meeting.
