For 55 years we have proudly showcased the artists and stories of this great community from our home in Masterton. With 25-30 diverse exhibitions a year, a collection housing 4000 artworks and taonga, alongside events and a vibrant education programme Aratoi provides the people of Masterton free entry into an environment that celebrates our history, creativity, and place in the world. The support of Masterton District Council has been integral to our success as a cultural institution and we are incredibly grateful for this ongoing partnership.

Aratoi congratulates Masterton District Council's commitment to culture and heritage and ways in which the Council champions the power of these spaces to uplift our community. At Aratoi we see ourselves as a key part of the council's family of services and central to the delivery of MDC's Arts, Culture and Heritage Strategy. We contribute to the Council's fulfilment of social goals and objectives whilst also being a significant way finder in the community, ensuring individuals and communities are connected and enriched through shared interests and community spirit. We bring together people across demographic groupings and help grow common understandings and collegiality through art, history, and social connection. As one of the central pou within the structure of Masterton's cultural whare we consider it our duty to engage with the council's crucial Long-Term planning –

1. Masterton District Library and Wairarapa Archive

We are whole heartly in support of the development and expansion of the Masterton District Library and Wairarapa Archive. These spaces are critical connectors of community and holders of our built and social history, their strengthening and preservation is to the benefit of all present and future residents of Masterton.

2. Town Centre improvements

As adjacent neighbours of Masterton's town centre we see the long-term benefits in investing in the infrastructure of this space. While we would love to see improvements to the 'look and feel'



to the area, which would encourage residents and visitors to spend more time in the town centre (with the economic benefits that often results from this), we understand need to balancing of this investment with the rates burden on residents.

We encourage Masterton District Council to keep Aratoi in mind through this Long-Term planning. Collaboration will be key for the maintenance and development of our cultural facilities, to protect our heritage, and grow our arts community. Aratoi has a strong desire to bring like-minded organisations together to explore long term sustainability approaches, with the proven ability to provide leadership in this space. There are also opportunities to be explored in working directly with the MDC to share resources for the benefit of the wider community - specifically in the space of shared storage solutions to meet long term needs, sharing information, and expanding the reach of our stories and collections.

We have proven our ability to stage world-class exhibitions, showcase the unique arts and heritage of our region, and all within a carefully controlled budget funded through a diverse range of supporters. Please do not underestimate the financial difficulties that are being felt in the local community. On top of the significant cost of living rises over a sustained period, now is not the time to impose high, compounding annual rates increases to pay for unnecessary capital expenditure (namely the Town Hall). The rising ageing population on low fixed incomes will suffer severe hardship if this is ignored. Moreover, attracting young families to the region will be severely compromised if rates are excessive and unaffordable, with a risk of the rate base stagnating or falling.

I appreciate that capital expenditure is necessary, but this should be targeted at more pressing priorities such as the three waters infrastructure - particularly the resilience of the water supply at risk from climate change and a rising population. Additionally, the council should do more to 'cut it's cloth' to reduce operational costs inline with central government human resource reductions and expenditure on consultants and contractors. Sustaining a staff of FTEs where 25.6% earn salaries above \$100k per year is not sustainable and efficiencies should be pursued. Finally, council should be challenging traffic management legislation as roading compliance costs seem to be an excessive bureaucratic driver that are increasing roading project costs by 40%. There has to be a more efficient way of safely delivering roadworks.

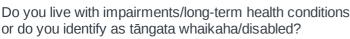

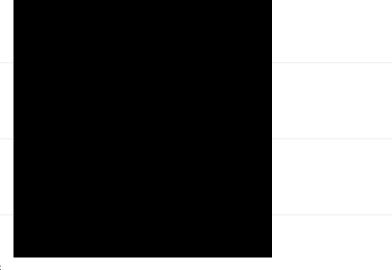

We do not need an events centre. As many people have pointed out, there are several event venues in Masterton as well as the one in Carterton. Further, the report you commissioned indicates that such a centre would get very little use. Please stop wasting our money.

Alternative Use.

You forecast that Masterton will grow to a population of 30,000+ in the 2030s. A much better use for the town hall's space would be to build town houses or apartments that could be sold or rented and help to accommodate the increased population. I would retain the green space in front of the building and provide a children's play area helping to attract young families to take up the accommodation.

My wife has used it occasionally but has given up because the, almost inevitable, replacement by a bus service is too unpleasant, and the risk of breakdown means that it is also unreliable.

I realize that the Council cannot fix the rail problem: however, it does have a role to play. We are both Supergold card holders so you would think that having a free service would be attractive. Even if (in our lifetime) the rail line is made viable, we are very unlikely to use the rail service more than occasionally. The reason is that despite having free travel on the train, a trip into Wellington by train costs us considerably more than the cost of driving. In addition, we are able to use our car when we get there.

The reason for this is that we live about 5km from the station. We rarely go into Wellington for only one day. There is no secure parking at the Masterton station and in any case, it is not permitted to park there overnight. There is no bus service from our location to Masterton which means that we must use a taxi to and from the station. The taxi costs more than the train fare, which we do not need to pay.

To whom it may concern,

Please accept this letter as my submission on the Town Hall proposals. I have attached a printout highlighting my agreement with the Howarth Report's concerns about the rebuilding of a town hall in Masterton.

This is not in my opinion, a wise nor expedient use of rate payers' money in the current financial climate. I would recommend that the cheapest option of expanding Wiaata House and the retained use of the Queen St offices be the one taken up.

In addition, I suggest that the land that the old town hall and buildings sit on be sold, and the money be used to pay down debt, to purchase the Queen St building, or be ring-fenced to be used in replacing key infrastructure such as water infratsructure.

It is possible that the town hall land could be sold to a developer who may look at building a community space, but this would then be at no risk to the council or the ratepayers, and would be available on a user-pays basis.

I would like to add that if we were to spend money on anything outside of the essentials, the expansion of the library would be a better use of money. The archives storage should be repaired, with the least cost to ratepayers.

Are the facts being hidden in plain sight?

The Horwath report commissioned by Masterton District Council 9 November 2020.

This report may have been read by many but appears to be ignored by some who will be making the decision.



Has due diligence been carried out on the two rebuild options MDC have proposed for the public to consider for submissions on the LTP ???? and if so why is this information not in front of us for consideration. The following points have been presented to our elected representatives in this updated Horwath Demand Analysis report and all are still relevant to the two rebuild options put forward for our consideration. I feel these observations and warnings (my words) are not being taken seriously, what do you think?

- New facilities will fall almost exclusively on Masterton ratepayers.
- Masterton is locationally and geographically disadvantaged which impacts on its competitiveness in winning large scale events.
- No regional or international direct air service at Hood Aerodrome.
- The Remutaka Hill road is challenging for many outsiders, especially in winter.
- Train services and times are limited and irregular.
- No bus connections from Masterton train station to the township.
- Solway Park is Masterton's largest hotel and conference venue. It is a "one stop destination resort" and has a competitive advantage with onsite accommodation. Owner/operator, Trust House, is a key funder of many different community organisations annually. There is no clear rationale for a Council owned and operated venue to "cannibalise" the income of Trust House owned Solway Park, one of its largest ratepayers.

- Solway Park meets the existing (and potential future) demand for conference and banquet space in Masterton
- The business case for developing a large flat-floor event space with capacity up to 1000 is not compelling.
- Smaller venues provide price advantage and host most events now.
- The Carterton Event Centre seats 350. It is the largest (non-school based) performing arts venue in the Wairarapa. CDC states it runs at a loss and is very rarely filled to capacity. It is 10 mins drive from Masterton.
- MDC would be taking business away from other venues which could result in a "race to the bottom" to have competitive advantage.
- A detailed business case is required to determine the optimal size from a financial feasibility perspective including ongoing operational costs.
- Professional Conference Organisers are moving to minimise financial risks by concentrating events in NZ's main centres for the foreseeable future.
- Major new convention centres are opening in Wellington, Christchurch and Auckland.
